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### ON THE TEN PLAGUES OF EGYPT: AN INTRODUCTION

TOPIC	EXPLANATION	NOTES
	In the process of displaying his wonders in Egypt, God had a number purposes in mind, of which judging the gods of Egypt served as one (Exo 12:12). The gods of Egypt weren't real, making the worship of them an abomination. In that era, when a Gentile nation was defeated in war, they assumed their gods had themselves been overcome or simply left the scene. <sup>1</sup> The LORD will not be overcome. Dumb idols were not to be feared (2 Kings 17:35-38), and them being judged in such fantastic orderliness in the ten plagues did also indicate a bigger plan was being executed.	On the surface, the original purpose of the plagues was to convince Pharaoh to let go the Israelites go. However, the original purpose quickly gets shrouded in deeper doctrine.
ON THE PURPOSES OF THE TEN PLAGUES IN EGYPT	When God ushers in a new era, he couples the event with visible confirmation (John 20:31) of his plan. Delivering the Israelites out of Egypt and establishing his covenant with Israel was no exception (Deut 4:34-35). The Israelites, who saw the numerous miracles and judgments, still were stiff-necked; the religious leaders in Jesus' day wanted to see a sign, and that was after Jesus had performed numerous miracles. Obviously, there are limitations with miracles and wonders. God knows when to move, how much to move and how to utilize this methodology to demonstrate that he is the true God. It's our responsibility to discern the situation and believe.	Anyone born into this world will have to have faith. Were God to come down to earth in person, we'd still have to prove it was him. <sup>2</sup> The requirement of faith by anyone living on earth is by design. On judgment day, the faith factor will be removed.
	Exodus and Romans are both clear that God raised up Pharaoh in order to display his power (Exo 9:16; Rom 9:17). Was that just for God to do that? We have to figure out the details. In plagues 1-5 and 7, Pharaoh hardened his own heart, but in plagues 6 and 8-10, God hardened Pharaoh's heart. Notice how Pharaoh had plenty of time. God knew the outcome from the start.	A vessel bent on opposing God can be used for God's purposes, such as judgment of another (Rom 9:22).

### ON THE TEN PLAGUES OF EGYPT: AN INTRODUCTION

TOPIC	EXPLANATION	NOTES
ON THE BACKGROUND AND DATE	It's not clear how much time the ten plagues took up, but the time of their exodus is clear (Exo 12:2). Further, according to I Kings 6:1, the children of Israel left Egypt exactly 480 years before King Solomon's 4th year in power, making the date of the exodus right at 1445 B.C. <sup>3</sup> In addition, ten, the total number of plagues, would embody the importance of the justice of God.	Moses was 40 years of age (Acts 7:23) when fleeing Egypt and age 80 when returning (Acts 7:30).
ON CONSTANT REMINDERS	God enjoys displaying his power and then reminding his people of that power, with the exodus of the children of Israel being being a prime example. God bringing Israel out of Egypt by his power and outstretched arm was a recurrent theme in the OT. It came up every passover.	Since it is so easy to forget (Psalm 78:11-12; 106:21), it should be no surprise to run into reminders.
ON FAITH	With all that happened, the children of Israel had ample opportunity to increase their faith.	Opportunities abounded!
THE LORD IS SALVATION	This is the first event in history that revealed this much detail on the salvation's background. The first generation had blood sacrifices, but not much was explicitly stated. The Israelites had to reach out in faith and follow through with the commandment involved in the passover before there would be protection for those in a particular house. God had to see the blood (Exo 12:22-23), and that shed blood was a necessary component (Heb 9:22).	Even though the Old Testament sacrifices could never actually save anyone, they served as a type for the Christ who was coming.
ON THE PROGRESSION FACTOR <sup>4</sup>	The first plague concerned water, a simple inconvenience. Even the magicians had fun with it. It's not even clear whether any people died. The last plague not only was the most serious, but also struck the heart of every Egyptian. Pharaoh was completely unconcerned with the first plague, but with the last one, he lost his first born. The Egyptian gods proved helpless.	In terms of the progression of the intensity and the orderly warnings, it's clear there was a bigger plan being carried out <sup>5</sup> by a living deity. <sup>6</sup>

Reasons for calamity include testing, chastisement and punishment, proving, and unanticipated good.<sup>7</sup>

### ONE: WATER INTO BLOOD (EXODUS 7:14-25)

TOPIC	EXPLANATION	NOTES
AN OVERALL SYNOPSIS OF THE ACCOUNT	For the first plague, Moses did the speaking and Aaron did the striking. After striking the Nile River with his staff, all the water in Egypt turned into blood. The dead fish proved the blood was real, and not an annual discoloration of the Nile.	As a result, the stench from the dead fish ruined the blessing of the Nile.
COULD THE MAGICIANS REPLICATE THE PLAGUE	The magicians got a kick out of replicating the first plague. Not being used to wide-scale miracles, they were probably hesitant at trying to undo the plague.	Undoing the entire plague would have had gotten far more attention.
WHAT WAS PHARAOH'S RESPONSE TO THIS PLAGUE	Pharaoh shrugged off the first plague as nothing. Being viewed as the son of Ra, Pharaoh would have seen himself as one who was above the God of Israel.	It's in God's character to be merciful, allowing for plenty of opportunities.
WHO HARDENED PHARAOH'S HEART	With God's judgments being righteous and just (Rev 16:7), he was not going to harden Pharaoh's heart in the first plague. Pharaoh having come from such a secular history can allow us to see why he was so quick to harden his own heart during round one. Of course, he enjoyed the service of the children of Israel.	While God came into this situation with the intention of hardening Pharaoh's heart, he did it through the lens of righteousness.
WHAT ABOUT GOSHEN AND THIS PLAGUE	Since the land of Goshen belonged to Egypt, and the plagues hit all of Egypt, we can surmise Goshen also got hit with the first plague (see Exo 8:22-23).	Israel's suffering during the first plague is not recorded.

WAS THERE A WARNING	God was righteous in giving Pharaoh a warning. Seeing this was round one, the intensity of the judgment wasn't all that fierce.	Pharaoh took glee in viewing the first plague almost as a joke.

### TWO:FROGS (EXODUS 8:1-15)

TOPIC	EXPLANATION	NOTES
AN OVERALL SYNOPSIS OF THE ACCOUNT	Aaron stretched out his staff over water, causing frogs to appear and get involved in all aspects of daily life in Egypt. One of their most revered animals had become a nuisance. Even though all of Egypt got slammed with frogs, this plague was another mere inconvenience.	The Egyptians revered the frogs as sacred <sup>2a</sup> , making a land full of dead frogs a repugnant sight to behold. The plagues pointed towards God's power.
COULD THE MAGICIANS REPLICATE THE PLAGUE	Even though the magicians were able to replicate the plague via their demonic channels, it makes you wonder why they didn't attempt to remove the plague.	No doubt, the magicians began to fear their power would soon wane.
WHAT WAS PHARAOH'S RESPONSE TO THIS PLAGUE	By the second plague, Pharaoh's tendencies began to emerge. Although Pharaoh is now acknowledging the God of the Hebrews, by allowing them to go and sacrifice, he is still seeing himself and their gods as supreme because he is bargaining with God and establishing the guidelines. Moses was clear with Moses from the start that the children of Israel needed to leave Egypt altogether.	What exactly was Pharaoh thinking? Was he concerned about his public reputation? Loss of free labor? Was he afraid of being shamed in front of all Egypt?
WHO HARDENED PHARAOH'S HEART	Here, Pharaoh hardened his own heart. In terms of God hardening a man's heart, Pharaoh is the only account we have where the story is laid out very clearly from the start to finish, making Pharaoh's account paramount when studying God's justice, righteousness and election. (See another story–Josh11:20.)	Once a public figure takes a stand, he is going to feel obligated to stick to that stand, thus adding to the temptation not to listen to God.
WHAT ABOUT GOSHEN	By allowing Goshen to experience the first three plagues, once they were protected,	the distinction was all the more clear.
WHICH GOD IN EGYPT GOT JUDGED	This plague judged Heqt <sup>2b</sup> , the frog-like goddess of birth and fertility and Hapi <sup>2c</sup> .	Facing the truth can really hurt.
WAS THERE A WARNING	Issuing warnings, which their gods couldn't do, displayed God's power. Everything the LORD said would transpire just as declared, proving how genuine he is.	Yes, there was a warning for plague number two.

AN OVERALL SYNOPSIS OF THE ACCOUNT	Without any kind of warning to Egypt, Aaron stretched out his staff and hit the ground, causing the dust of the earth to become gnats <sup>3a</sup> . The gnats were on man and the animals both. Would I to have to live through one, it would be this one, granted that it would be gnats, and not lice or some other small critter. <sup>3b</sup>	From the written account in Exodus, this plague doesn't appear as messy as the other ones, particularly the ones coming up.
COULD THE MAGICIANS REPLICATE THE PLAGUE	The magicians most certainly started to fear how much power they themselves actually had; their own powers went to the wayside this round. By acknowledging that the finger of God was at work, they were in effect acknowledging doubt in their own gods before the plagues ever began. Since being the knowledge of the one true God is in each heart (Ecc 3:11), when he does move, one must acknowledge that, even if originally there was belief in another god (Rev 16:11).	Even with their multitude of gods, the Egyptians were not acquainted with miracles on a large-scale level.  Moreover, here the devil's power simply couldn't go anymore. God is never limited to time, matter or space.
ON PHARAOH'S RESPONSE	Pharaoh would still not listen.	Pride would have been a main reason.
WHO HARDENED PHARAOH'S HEART	Again, Pharaoh hardened his heart. It's getting dangerous for Pharaoh because not listening is becoming a habitual practice for him.  Again, Pharaoh hardened his heart. It's getting dangerous for Pharaoh because more plagues were con	
WHAT ABOUT GOSHEN	This would be the last time Goshen would endure a plague. Maybe, this was a reaso	n why the initial three were lighter.
WHICH GOD IN EGYPT GOT JUDGED	Geb, the god of the earth, got smacked, thereby not being able to bring out the "so-called" bounty of the earth. <sup>3c</sup>	At this point, the Egyptians have to have questions regarding their gods.
WAS THERE A WARNING	Plagues three, six and nine came without an official warning. However, due to the plagues appearing in succession, the earlier plagues themselves served as warnings. Logic said that more plagues were coming.	Miracles from heaven can have a great impact on people believing in God.

### FOUR: FLIES (EXODUS 8:20-32)

TOPIC	EXPLANATION	NOTES	
AN OVERALL SYNOPSIS OF THE ACCOUNT	In the fourth plague, swarms of flies pervaded throughout Egypt. The Hebrew only has ערב, meaning swarms, but it does not contain the word "flies". Some think these swarms may have been a type of beetle prevalent in Egypt in that day.	By now word on the plagues would have been getting around the world, putting their reputation at stake.	
ON STATING GOD'S SOVEREIGNTY TO THE EGYPTIANS	"And they shall know that I am the LORD" appears frequently in the Old Testament.  This statement is always preceded by an act of God. It may not necessarily mean that the recipients will verbally acknowledge God's sovereign work; however, it does mean that they will know in their hearts the end result of the work of God.	The Muslims, who know God is blessing Israel, making maps without Israel is NOT denying God's work. In their hearts, they know the truth.

ON PHARAOH'S RESPONSE	Pharaoh initially was going to allow them to leave, but their livestock needed to stay behind. In the end, Pharaoh still changed his mind on the matter and would not let them go. He was still haggling with God on how to obey, not a good thing.	Running from a problem only delays the inevitable and often times simply makes the matter worse.
WHO HARDENED HIS HEART	It was too late; God was hardening Pharaoh's heart. Pharaoh had turned into a puppet for the Almighty with no hope for any change for the better.	Pharaoh bringing up the topic of murder was due to a hardened heart.
WHICH GOD IN EGYPT GOT JUDGED	The sun god Ra got judged in the ninth plague. Perhaps, Khepri, the morning sun, Ra, the midday sun, and Atum, the evening sun <sup>9a</sup> all three were judged here. In keeping with an intensified progression, Ra, one of their greatest deities was judged right before the last, main plague came into play.	Darkness, the embodiment of death, judgment, and hopelessness <sup>9b</sup> , pervaded the land, making Ra, their sun god, look like nothing.
WAS THERE A WARNING	For the third time, God has a plague executed without warning. If this plague was ignited during the day, which it probably was, there would have been a cause for concern, such as someone trying to round up animals that were roaming around or someone working on a roof would have been in quite a predicament.	Without God's presence in the earth, everyone would have a dark heart. Pharaoh, the so-called light in Egypt, is now the cause of complete darkness.
WHAT ABOUT GOSHEN AND THIS PLAGUE	Any Egyptian getting to work in Goshen would have fought to keep his privileged position. Anyone in Christ has all eternity to look forward to without a struggle.	The light that Goshen received reflected the power or their real God.

It would be better to read about the apocalypse than have to live through it. In the case of the ten plagues of Egypt, it would, no doubt, be the same.

### TEN: DEATH OF FIRSTBORN – THE PASSOVER (EXODUS 11-12)

TOPIC	EXPLANATION	NOTES
AN INTRODUCTION TO THE PASSOVER	There was a nice, progressive succession. Initially, the magicians replicated the plagues, and the Hebrews also suffered. Then, there were no replications, and the land of Goshen became exempt. The middle plagues led to the final plagues, with the tenth plague being the first with requirements for Israel. The Hebrews thrived, but the Egyptians lost all of the battles.	So, Goshen was not automatically exempt from the tenth plague? Egyptian personnel working in Goshen would have had casualties.
AN OVERALL SYNOPSIS OF THE ACCOUNT	Since an entire people was preparing to enter the desert, they needed things, which they got from the Egyptians. Further, a clear warning on the tenth plague was given to Pharaoh, who was possibly Thutmose III <sup>10a</sup> or Amenhotep II <sup>10b</sup> . Basically, all the firstborn in the land would die. For the Israelites, protection from the tenth plague was called the passover, which ended up becoming the major holy day in Israel. At midnight when the destroyer, probably an angel of God, killed all the firstborn in Egypt, the entire nation, Pharaoh, his servants and the people got up and sent the Israelites away. They had said, "We shall all be dead (Exo 12:33)." Pharaoh's firstborn, also viewed as a god <sup>10c</sup> , lost his life, hitting Pharaoh right where it hurts. After the tenth plague was executed, Pharaoh acknowledged the God of Israel is real.	The tenth plague launched the main Jewish holy day, the passover.  Basically, the destroyer killed all the firstborn in Egypt, but he passed over the Israelites. The word passover comes from Exodus 12:13 and 12:27.  Moreover, the book of Exodus provides an abundance of themes suitable for giving the gospel in today's age. 10d
THE REQUIREMENTS AND RESULTS STEMMING FROM THE PASSOVER	The requirements, followed by all the Israelites (Exo 12:50), resulted in the protection of this plague, with the main requirement being the applying of blood to the tops and sides of the door of the house. There were also other requirements (Exo 12:4-11). Subsequent passovers would last seven days. Even in the Old Testament, salvation came by faith (Gen 15:6). In light of this truth, how could these requirements be without works? A household may have eight people, of which only one person could apply the blood on the sides and tops of the door of the house. They had to believe the words from God that Moses spoke to them. A real faith produces results in outward obedience. The result was getting passed over.	Anyone who participated in the passover had to be circumcised. There was not a house in Egypt without a death of a firstborn (Exo 12:30), so it's clear that none of the Egyptians were circumcised nor were any of them to participate in the passover reserved only for Israel (Exo 12:45).

### TEN: THE AFTERMATH – THE RED SEA (EXODUS 12-14)

TOPIC	EXPLANATION	NOTES
ON PHARAOH'S RESPONSE	Initially, Pharaoh and all of Egypt literally pushed Israel out of their land. Then, the Lord hardened Pharaoh's heart one last time as to cause him to pursue the Israelites one more time, only to meet his final defeat in the Red Sea.	Reading about Pharaoh being turned into a pawn (vessel fit for destruction) for God, we should learn a lesson.
WHO HARDENED PHARAOH'S HEART	The Lord hardened Pharaoh's heart (14:4, 17), with Pharaoh being intent on bloodshed. It appears that not all of Pharaoh's army got swept up by the Red Sea as it states that "of all the host of Pharaoh that had followed them into the sea (14:28)," leaving the possibility open that some stayed behind to return to Egypt to relay the final account to Egypt. Of course, they also wanted to save their lives.	Having an entire people group serving you does sound enticing. Pharaoh may still have been reluctant to let go of all that cheap labor. Truthfully, at this point, he also had other thoughts.
WHICH GOD IN EGYPT GOT JUDGED	Truth be known, which gods or goddesses got judged in the last plague or in any plague depends on which author you read. God said that He would judge all the gods of Egypt (12:12) in the final plague. Others say Pharaoh himself, viewed as a son of Ra, the sun god, was judged. 10e Yet others contend that Isis was judged. 10f	In Exodus 12:12, God states, "I am the LORD." The Egyptians were claiming other deities, but there is only one real God, the God of Israel.
WAS THERE A WARNING	With Moses having become very great in the sight of the people, it makes you wonder how his message fell on deaf ears. With nine plagues already past, it makes you wonder what Pharaoh was thinking at the very, clear warning of the tenth plague. Without God hardening his heart, he may have let them go earlier.	Yes, there was a warning before the tenth plague fell on all Egypt. Further, it does appear that Pharaoh did see Moses' face again (Exodus 12:31-32).
ON STATING GOD'S SOVEREIGNTY TO THE EGYPTIANS	When God says that they shall know that "I am the LORD," he always does a certain work first. Here, it was the destruction of Pharaoh's army. (See Exodus 14:18)	There will always only be one true, sovereign God. All will bow one day.
